#### Good morning,

My name is Sadie Harrap and I am the school captain of Murchison Primary School I have the privilege to talk to you the morning about what ANZAC day means to me and my family Sacrifice is one of the first words that comes to my mind.

The young people who went to war when they were not a lot older than me.

I think of how hard and frightening it would have been to leave your family's and travel to war when you were only a teenager or a young adult. It is a day where we show our pride, our respect and our gratefulness for all that these people have given us, the greatest gift, our freedom. We see people here today proudly wearing medals they have been rewarded or that had belonged to family members.

I am proud to say that three of my family members risked their lives for our county today.

The first person was my uncle, Brett, He fought in the war and he was a driver in the Royal Australian Corp of Transport and also did two tours of Afghanistan in 2010 and 2014.

The second person was my Great, Great Grandfather William Hull. He was an original ANZAC in the first world war in 1914 in Gallipoli. He fought from 1914-1915. They then got evacuated to Egypt for a rest and then moved to France where he had his 21<sup>st</sup> birthday in the trenchers were he fought from 1915-1918. His service number was 2747.

He was only just 18 when he enrolled. He was one of the fortunate young people who got to come home, although he did get gassed three times he did survive but had long term health issues which caused him to move to the country, Avenel, where my great grandmother and grandfather still live today.

The last person was my great nana she was a nurse in the second world war in the year of 1939. People who have given so much for our country today make me want to be the best person and I can be and to be able show the true ANZAC spirit that all that the ANZACS had.

Here is a little story of my great, great grandfather and great grandmother who went to war as you have heard a minute ago. William had a good mate I can't remember his name but they stuck around for each other like we should all today to our friends and also our family, they stuck around in war together and made sure nobody was left behind and I feel and I am sure some of you do to that we should all look out for each other like they did for us.

My great Nana was a nurse and she made some good friends to she also able a few peoples lives so that makes me feel proud that she got to save some of those peoples life and she got to let them go home to there family and there friends.

And that is why I want to show the true ANZAC spirt

#### Good morning

My name is Grace Morgan and I am a School Captain at Murchison Primary School. I am going to talk to you about the Victoria Cross. What it is, why it is awarded and tell you a story of a person who received it.

I am the crimson ribbon. I am the valueless cross. I am made of metal from a cannon. It's me the Victoria Cross. I was thought to look the lowest but am reserved for the highest. Many have the wooden cross, yet I belong to very few. I honor valor and the highest level of gallantry. For sacrificing their lives for others, they didn't go unnoticed. We can be awarded posthumously for those deserving. Everywhere their names are written... I follow for the rest of their lives. Here is a story about what the Victoria Cross represents...

There were two men, Kevin Wheatley also known as Dasher, because of his Rugby Union prowess, and Ron Swanton Butch. Dasher and Butch had been friends for a long time. They were on a destroy mission in Vietnam with a group of South Vietnamese and suddenly became under heavy fire. When a South Vietnamese went down, Butch rushed over to pick him up and suffered a serious gunshot wound to the chest. As Dasher was providing covering fire, he quickly went to Butch's aid and carried him to a South Vietnamese medic who said he would not survive for much longer. Butch refused to leave Dasher and dragged him into a semi-safe, wooded area and laid him down. As many Vietnam Cong members were in range, Dasher pulled the last pins from his two grenades and kneeled next to Butch the whole time. One last South Vietnamese soldier ran off into the forest as he heard the last two grenades explode and small arms fire. This soldier was the last to see Dasher and Butch alive and reported that Dasher would never have left Butch. The next morning a search mission went out and they were found with several gunshot wounds, and Dasher was still laying

Kevin Wheatley was awarded the Victoria Cross posthumously for his actions. This is an amazing story that shows that they went to war not only for us but for each other. There's a quote that relates to Kevin's story "There are friends in life and there are friends for life" by unknown. When Dasher died he was only twenty-eight years old. I could never imagine sacrificing my life for another person at the age of twenty-eight. He had four children and a dearly loved wife when he left. His oldest son George went with him to Sydney and watched him walk onto the ship and that was the last time he saw him.
