Little Learners Love Literacy

The Foundation, Year 1 and 2 team are very excited to be implementing a literacy program called Little Learners Love Literacy, a structured and explicit program with engaging multisensory activities. It is a fun, engaging and evidence-based literacy program that is carefully sequenced in seven stages to teach children the 44 sounds of the English language and the principles of the alphabetic code (that each speech sound can be represented by different groups of letters, such as the sound /ī/ as in I, sky, pie, ice, cycle, and that a letter (or group of letters) can represent different sounds, such as the letter 'y' in yes, gym, funny, sky.



Did you know that learning the alphabetic code gives children the knowledge to read and spell 84% of ALL words? (Hanna, Hanna, Hodges, and Rudorf, 1966)

We start with teaching the simple code in Stages 1–4. We will focus on phonics and phonemic awareness to build the strongest foundations for reading and spelling success. We will also focus on building vocabulary and oral language skills to develop equally strong foundations for comprehension and writing.

Meet Milo and friends

In the first few weeks of term, we will be learning letters and sounds. We will be enjoying the Milo's Birthday Surprise storybook, meeting a new character and sound regularly. We will also learn to blend sounds to say words with the Ally alligator puppet and segment them for spelling, as well as learning handwriting.



Decodable books

Once we finish teaching a Stage, we will start to send home Pip and Tim decodable books. (This will vary depending on your child's level of development) These are our secret to success – our 'no tricks' books. Each story practises the sounds and letters that we have taught, so children will be able to read the books themselves by sounding out and blending.

How can you support you child at home?



Reading to your child

Read many books to your child and talk about what you just read.

This is crucial for vocabulary and linguistic comprehension. Choosing a quiet time, such as bedtime, can help build an easy and fun reading routine.

Activities

Complete activities that have been given to your child over the week, reinforcing the letter sound focus for each week (in STAR folder). These could be recorded as nights of reading, along with picture storybooks or readers depending on your child's Little Learners Love Literacy stage.



Play with sounds



Read the Little Learners letter that we will send home each week. Ask your child the

questions that are included with the letter.

This will support the development of phonemic awareness (helping in the ability to identify,

blend, segment and manipulate speech sounds within words).

Say the sounds

Say the 'pure' sounds without an 'uh' sound on the end; for example, 'IIIII' rather than 'luh'. You can listen to the sounds on the Little Learners Love Literacy® YouTube channel.

Practise decoding

When our decodable storybooks start to come home later, encourage your child to sound out to read unknown words. Remember that this is the beginning of your child's learning to read journey and, just as when they were learning to walk, your child will need support to build confidence reading.

Basketball Skills Session



Good morning. My name is Jet Williams and I am a School Captain at Murchison Primary School this year. This speech, which I have written, is about Murchison and how our community commemorate ANZAC Day.

Every year Murchison Primary School holds an ANZAC Day service. All year 6 students have something to say during the service; this is my favourite part



At Murchison Primary School we have history lessons that help us understand the effects of war in the world. During our Art Lessons, we also learn about war. We all focus on a finished piece of work around ANZAC day that relates to war. All students work hard and with interest to do their best work and we have these Art works on display during this special time. My favourite piece of artwork was a silhouette of a soldier standing in a field of poppies. The morning sky behind the soldier was a dark blue colour. The same colour as a stormy sea. You may see these Art works displayed in our local community shop windows.

Every year we gather here at dawn to pay our respects to the service men and women that have served our country. So many of our local community attend and pay their respects. During this community service, the item that means the most to me is the minute of silence. After this service the tradition continues with a delicious Aussie breakfast provided by the SES. Just another Murchison tradition that will continue for years to come. ANZAC Day... a time to reflect, a time to remember the sacrifices, a time to remember our local community. Living in this amazing town we call Murchison.



Good morning and welcome; my name is Isabella and I am one of the school captains at Murchison Primary School. I am honoured to be here today. To remember those who have fought for our country but also to talk about the role of woman and how their part in war has changed throughout history.

When talking about war, and learning history we always focus on the battle, the violence & fighting and what it meant. However, as a young girl I always wondered about the women during these times. How did they fit in? What did they do during the war?

Women started out helping on the home front as war fund workers. They undertook duties as Red Cross Voluntary Aids, packed care parcels for soldiers, knitted and were nurses. All of these roles kept them safe from

harm. However, these duties were not acknowledged as proper war work.

It was interesting that the care parcels for soldiers had in them what is known today as the "ANZAC biscuit". These biscuits were made as none of the ingredients spoiled during the long journey. They were also created to raise funds for the war effort and used as a connection to the war.

It was during War World 1 that women were given the opportunity to become nurses in the Australian Army Nursing Service. However even then, women were expected to be single or widowed. Women who were married had to go through a recruiting check.

During World War II, women started to play more active roles with the creation of the Women's Auxiliary Services and opening of positions due to the shortage of manpower. As time continued, women began to serve in the defence force on naval ships, in operational positions in

the army and the air force. 2,139 women served in the Australian Army Services overseas during War World II.

Women faced many challenges but continued to fill roles as they worked not only as nurses but drove trucks, repaired airplanes and many more contributions.

Although all support roles of women ended at the end of the war. It wasn't until the late 1970s that women were given permeant roles in the defence force. However, this was still restricted as they were not allowed to apply for combat roles.

Today women are on the front lines of the Australian Defence Force! They make-up roughly 20% of permanent ADF workers and have no restrictions. Women today fight alongside men and receive the same training and opportunities as men.

Today we stand here on to remember what occurred on April 25th, 1915, as Australian & New Zealand Army Corps fought in Gallipoli. We remember them, their battle, their sacrifice always. But also, for myself and perhaps others, to remember the little things that have a big impact... that sometimes aren't showcased but can help shape woman of the future. Through thinking about the woman of the past and how brave, resilient, and strong they were.
